[REDACTED] My aunt, my aunt was living (inaudible) Point and well she was moving out of it and um we were packing away the items, like (inaudible) cause I was the one who was packing, but I forgot to pack some stuff and my cousin um picked up a needle, well she already had it in her hand, because she was putting it away, but then she put it my eye and said hold your eye cause if you move this needle will blind and she put it in my eye.

HC: Which eye?

HC: Your right eye, and did she put it into the colored part or the white part?

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[REDACTED] It felt like it went in the um colored part.

HC: And how long did she hold it there?

HC: And was there anything inside the needle?

HC: Okay. And who using insulin in the house?
